
No longer enigmatic - Batrachochytrium dendrobatidis ("Bd")

First recognised in 1998 but now traced back to museum specimens from the 1930's


The challenge of Chytrid mediated declines

- They are extremely rapid
- They are poorly understood
- They are hard to predict
- There are no known in situ mitigation measures
- They are getting worse
- They are the major cause of extinctions





Global Amphibian Assessment (GAA)(2004)



Nearly half of all amphibian species are declining, 1,891 known to be threatened Another 1,290 data deficient – many suspected to be in decline

Problem Statement for ex situ community


- Greatest species conservation challenge
- Mass extinction without ex situ help
- We are <u>uniquely capable</u> of help
- We are <u>expected</u> to help
- All zoos can and <u>must</u> help
- We <u>cannot</u> fail to act



The Unique Qualifications of the *Ex Situ* Community

- >1200 accredited zoos
- >100,000 employees
- >600 million visitors/year
 - 1 in 10 people every year!
- ~1000 websites
- ~250,000 amphibians of ~400 species
 - TAGs, studbooks
- private sector
 - 12,000 members of DGHT/EUFORA
 - 100-200 species have been bred in multiple generations
 - 1 breeder has 1.5-2 million offspring/year








How it works

- Each regional association of WAZA will run the 2008
 Year of the Frog campaign locally with individual
 institutional sign-up (EAZA Amphibian Alarm 2008 year
 of the Frog)
- Some events will be global and involve participation from institutions around the world
- Regional associations can run more specific events
- Institutions develop their own campaign activities as with other EAZA campaigns

10 good reasons to join the campaign

- 1. After surviving for 360 million years, one-third to one-half of all amphibian species are in danger of becoming extinct.....potentially the single greatest disappearance of species since the dinosaurs.
- 2. Amphibians matter. They play a critical role in the ecosystems as both predator and prey, they perform a pest control service and their skin has substances that offer promising medicinal cures for humans.
- 3. The *ex situ* programme provides a real solution for those amphibians endangered by the most urgent threat, chytrid fungus.
- 4. Many people don't know how important or threatened amphibians are. This is a chance for zoos to excel at one of their most important roles: education.
- 5. This is truly the first global initiative to save endangered animals. Local zoos can and should play a role in this unified effort.
- 6. Participation provides an opportunity to engage your local community in a global crisis.
- 7. The crisis provides a unique opportunity to demonstrate to the world that zoos and aquariums are valid and powerful conservation partners


10 good reasons to join the campaign cont.

- 8. The efforts of this global collaboration can lay the groundwork for future global conservation efforts.
- 9. Zoos and aquariums must not stand by and watch hundreds of these exquisite species become extinct in our lifetime......especially when *ex situ* captive breeding provides a viable yet simple solution. If we do not respond immediately and on an unprecedented scale, much of an entire vertebrate class will be lost, and we will have failed in our most basic conservation mission.
- 10. Amphibian Ark demonstrates to humankind what can be accomplished by people working together for a common cause. The result will be empowerment for the public to get involved in solving future problems and responding to future crises.
