Syzygium micklethwaitii ssp. micklethwaitii

About me: I am found in upland forests of Kenya and Tanzania. I am from the eucalyptus family (Myrtaceae). I have edible fruits like my two cousins *Syzygium guineense* and *Syzygium cordatum* and we all have white flowers and edible purple-black fruit. I am special because I have been living alone on remote hills in southeast Kenya such as Kasigau and Taita so I am slightly different. The base of my leaves is rounded and I can grow to 30 m so I am the tallest tree of the three of us.

Why I'm rare: My forest home is being cleared for farmland and to grow non-native Blue Gum (*Eucalyptus*) plantations. As a result I am now listed as **Vulnerable** on the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species and require conservation action to guarantee my future survival in the wild. I am also very difficult to propagate.

Taking action: The Global Trees Campaign is working with African botanic gardens, such as Brackenhurst Botanic Garden, to replant me in my natural habitat.
