Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

Botanic Gardens Conservation International was established as the Botanic Gardens Conservation Secretariat by IUCN, the World Conservation Union, at the beginning of 1987. In 1990 it became a separate entity and in 1994 changed its name to Botanic Gardens Conservation International.

On 20 February 2003, Botanic Gardens Conservation International (a company limited by guarantee) was incorporated. Charitable status was granted, and with effect from 1 January 2004, all assets, rights and liabilities were transferred from Botanic Gardens Conservation International to this new company. Botanic Gardens Conservation International (the trust) became dormant from this date. Botanic Gardens Conservation International is governed by a memorandum and articles of association and the liability of the members is limited to £10 per member.

Organisational Structure

BGCI is governed by the Board of Trustees that meets quarterly to guide the organisation's work programme and to review management accounts, future development and other organisational matters.

Day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Secretary General, who acts as BGCl's chief executive officer reporting to the Board.

The charity is guided by the International Advisory Council. The Council consists of highly respected leaders of the botanic garden and plant conservation community. They provide technical and scientific guidance and advice on the strategic direction of BGCI.

The charity has recently established a Finance and Audit Committee which will meet on a regular basis to review and monitor financial and risk management issues.

Appointment of Trustees

New Trustees (who are also Directors of the company) can be appointed by decision of the majority of the Trustees present and voting at any duly constituted meeting. The total number of Trustees shall be not less than three.

Affiliation

BGCI is a worldwide membership organisation. It has offices in China, The Netherlands, and Spain.

BGCI has sister organisations in the United States of America and the Russian Federation:

- BGCI-US was established in 1984 and is registered as a Not for Profit Organisation in the State of Massachusetts. It is tax exempt (IRS 0427 30954) and has 501(c) 3 status
- BGCI Russia was established in 2002 and is registered as Division of the International Non-Government Non-Profit Organization "Botanic Gardens Conservation International within the Russian Federation".

Fundraising Standards Board

BGCI is a member of the Fundraising Standards Board, the self-regulatory body for fundraising in the UK, members of which agree to adhere to the highest standard of good practice with their fundraising and to establish a Fundraising Promise incorporating a clear complaints procedure.

Risk Management

A Risk Register which considers the major risks facing the charity, their impact and likelihood of occurrence and identified means of mitigating the risks is in place. The Risk Register is reviewed on an annual basis. The Trustees are satisfied that this process is adequate to assess the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed.

Grants Made for Projects

BGCI's policy on making grants is set out in note 1(g) to the financial statements.

Volunteers and Donated Services and Facilities

BGCI's policy on the value of these services provided is set out in note 1(j) to the financial statements.

Objectives and Activities

Objectives

The objectives of Botanic Gardens Conservation International are as follows:

- To promote for the public benefit the conservation and protection of plant species of the world, in particular the cultivation and maintenance of such plants by Botanic Gardens
- To promote the advancement of education of the public and vocational training and research concerning such plants and their conservation
- To gather and disseminate information on wild plants cultivated or maintained in Botanic Gardens for the purpose of such conservation
- To establish an international network of plant resources via an international database for the purposes of such conservation

When planning its objectives and activities for the year, BGCl has considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

Main objectives for the year and strategies for achieving them

- To consolidate the development of BGCI from a small largely UK based organisation to an internationally recognised medium sized organisation capable of delivering high quality programmes world-wide
- To identify new medium and long term opportunities to support BGCI, botanic gardens and plant conservation
- To implement activities in accordance with BGCI's Medium Term Plan 2007 2012 and through this:
 - support the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation
 - o implement the International Agenda for Botanic Gardens in Conservation

Significant Activities, Achievements and Performance

BGCI continued its global programme of plant conservation and education activities in partnership with botanic gardens, networks and other conservation organisations through the provision of advice, information, training and regional workshops. The main countries/areas of activity were: East Africa, China, the Middle East, Colombia, Cuba, Kyrgyzstan, Pakistan, UK and the USA. An in-depth review of BGCI's China programme was initiated.

A major activity was the organisation of the 4th Global Botanic Gardens Congress, which was hosted by the National Botanic Gardens of Ireland in June.

The charity continued to attract project funding through trusts and foundations. Core income from our botanic garden membership is stable and growing.

Preventing Plant Extinctions

In China, Colombia and Cuba, a number of tree species restoration projects, in many cases working closely with the local community, were implemented. With funding from the Foundation Franklinia, *exsitu* conservation and restoration of tree species included threatened *Magnolia* and *Acer* species.

In Pakistan, BGCI is implementing a project in collaboration with the Pakistan Botanic Gardens Network Secretariat (PBGN), Government College University (GCU) of Lahore aimed at the conservation of threatened native trees in dryland ecosystems of the Indus plains in Pakistan's Punjab province. In Kyrgyzstan, a three-year international project of the Centre for Conservation Ecology and Environmental Change (Bournemouth University), FFI and BGCI has been initiated to conserve the wild fruit and nut tree forests of the Tien Shan of Kyrgyzstan. BGCI is working with Gareev Botanical Garden of the National Academy of Sciences in Bishkek to enhance the value of the garden's collections and to strengthen its public outreach capacity.

Plants for People

BGCI continued to support work in Uganda and Madagascar and completed a discussion document, entitled *Wild plants for food and medicine – challenges for conservation and sustainable use by local communities*. The document was made available via BGCI's website to stimulate further debate and sharing of experiences on these complex issues.

Trustees' and Directors' Report for the year ended 31 December 2010 (continued)

The Global Trees Campaign

Work continued on the Red List of Rhododendrons and BGCI became a member of IUCN's Red List Partnership. Efforts are also on-going to produce an assessment of the extinction risk of montane tree species in the tropical Andes, including the potential effects of climate change. The survey of *ex situ* Acer collections was completed and published on the BGCI website.

Databases

Development of BGCl's Garden and PlantSearch databases continued. As well as the IUCN Red Lists, PlantSearch is now linked to lists of Crop Wild Relatives, the Tree Conservation Database, medicinal plants, CITES listed plants, Tropicos, and Plants of the World. 2,825 botanic gardens are listed in the GardenSearch database, of which 855 have submitted plant lists for PlantSearch. There are 261,000 taxa listed in the database as at the end of December 2010. An analysis of the data in PlantSearch was carried out to produce a report on global progress towards Target 8 of the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation. This report was presented at the 10th Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity in Nagoya, Japan in October.

Capacity building and networking

BGCI organised the first International Certificate in Botanic Garden Management in the Asia Pacific Region, Singapore Botanic Gardens (5-20th March 2010). The course was attended by 14 participants from across the region.

In June BGCI organised the 4th Global Botanic Gardens Congress, hosted by the National Botanic Gardens of Ireland. Over 370 people from 53 countries participated.

Publications

BGCI published its regular serial publications during the year. These consisted of two issues of Cuttings, BGCI's newsletter, two issues of BGjournal and two issues of Roots. BGjournal was supported by the Rufford Foundation and was themed on *Ex situ conservation* – the value of plant collections (January 2010) and the *Global Strategy for Plant Conservation* (July 2010). Two issues of Roots were published – 7:1 on *Education and horticulture* and 7:2 on *Education and the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation*.

Four additional publications were produced and distributed to members during the year. These were:

Towards a new social purpose: Redefining the role of botanic gardens - a report based on a one-year research project carried out in collaboration with the University of Leicester.

Islamic gardens in the UK – Dynamics of conservation, culture and communities.

Saving plants, saving the planet: Botanic gardens and the implementation of GSPC Target 8.

Conserving North America's threatened plants - progress report on Target 8 of the GSPC.

An outreach brochure on BGCI's China Programme was also produced in English and Chinese.

Sara Oldfield's book 'Botanic Gardens, Modern Day Arks' was published in 2010. All royalties from the sale of the book will support the work of BGCI.

Website

The BGCI website (<u>www.bgci.org</u>) continues to promote the projects BGCI is implementing and broaden its appeal, ensuring that a wider audience understands our work and to raise awareness of plant conservation. To highlight new information on the website, BGCI also produces and distributes to on-line subscribers two e-bulletins – four issues of Cultivate and twelve issues of Education E-Update were sent out during the year.

Consultancies

Our consultancy in the Middle East involved providing on-going advice to the Oman Botanic Garden development. We also undertook several other small consultancy assignments.

Policy Frameworks

BGCI continued to achieve global recognition for its international policy work in relation to plant conservation, specifically by providing major support for the Global Partnership for Plant Conservation (GPPC), the global coalition facilitating promotion and implementation of the CBD Global Strategy for Plant Conservation (GSPC). The formation of the GPPC brings together leading agencies involved in plant conservation around the world to work on an ambitious agenda of *in-situ* and *ex-situ* conservation, sustainable use of plant resources, capacity building and education.

In 2010, a review of the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation was completed and a revised strategy with updated targets for 2020 was developed and adopted by the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity.

BGCI developed a public awareness campaign to generate support for the GSPC called 'Plants for the Planet'.

Education

BGCI continued its social research work funded by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation. One project focused on Islamic gardens in the UK and looked at the need, potential value and viability of establishing Islamic gardens in the UK within the context of British Muslims' attitudes towards botanic gardens and the environment.

The second project concerned Botanic Gardens and social inclusion. BGCI commissioned Leicester University to carry out research into the social role of botanic gardens with the aim of encouraging botanic gardens to address this challenge. This project was funded for a second year to allow two pilot projects in extending the social role of botanic gardens to be developed, delivered and evaluated.

A separate project funded by the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation entitled 'Seeds of Unity' began in autumn of 2010 which sets out to develop online educational resources for teachers and botanic garden educators which explore the links between plants and faith in order to engage new audiences and promote public understanding of the value to the environment.

In 2010 BGCI again collaborated with Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden in judging and completing the Fairchild Challenge/BGCI Global Option. The BGCI global option invited young people to design a CD-cover for a new single dedicated to BGCI by a UK band.

4D4 Life

4D4 Life is an EU funded programme to build the taxonomic capabilities of the Species 2000 Catalogue of Life through a number of Global Species Databases using integrated services. BGCI has been engaged by the University of Reading, the funding lead, to direct a series of activities to foster a culture of co-operation both between the partners in the programme and between them and the different user communities, and will be directly responsible for engagement with scientific users and partners through user surveys and electronic updates and newsletters.

Activities of overseas offices

The China office, based at South China Botanic Garden (SCBG), provides an ongoing coordinating role for our on the ground project work undertaken in partnership with several organisations including the Chinese Academy of Sciences (SCBG, Kunming Botanic Garden and Institute of Botany) and Yunnan Introduction and Propagation Center for Rare and Endangered Plant Species. The office has proved vital in supporting our expanding role in the country. In 2010 a review of BGCl's conservation work in China was initiated.

The USA office, based at Chicago Botanic Garden, has proven to be an important base for developing our role in plant conservation in the USA and for building up fund raising opportunities. The office also plays a vital role in connecting BGCI's U.S. members to our global plant conservation network. The office has been successful at raising funds and is now self-funding. A review of the conservation status of North American threatened plants (involving botanic gardens in the USA, Mexico and Canada) resulted in a well-received report and the provision of additional data from this region for BGCI's PlantSearch database. The Executive Director of BGCI US serves on Committees of the American Public Garden providing an opportunity to increase networking and collaboration between BGCI and other partner institutions and botanic gardens.

Financial Review and Reserves

The transactions of the charity are summarised on page 12 of the financial statements, with further details of restricted funds transactions in note 11 on page 19.

The charity in common with many other similar charities receives its donation and grant income with fluctuations in timing and frequency. Payments are dependent on a number of factors such as the cash flow of funders, the completion of work and the submission of reports. In some cases funding is provided in advance of work and in other cases the charity prefinances expenditure.

At the year end net assets and total funds showed a surplus of £84,525 which was made up of restricted funds of £204,492 and negative unrestricted funds of £119,167. The Board is cognisant of the risk that in such circumstances it may appear that a charity may not be able to fulfil its obligation to deliver against the restricted funds it has received. However, the Board has been monitoring this situation closely and of the year end restricted funds c£150,000 has been fully and properly applied to qualifying expenditure by the time these financial statements have been approved and most of the balance will be spent by 31 December 2011.

The charity is on course to build up its unrestricted reserve and management and the Board have implemented procedures to improve the deficit on unrestricted funds. New income generating initiatives as well as expenditure cuts are improving the situation. 2010 expenditure includes £28,299 of one off restructuring to enable this. Conservative forecasts for the year ended 31 December 2011 show that there is an overall surplus of income over expenditure. In particular, unrestricted funds are expected to increase by c£85,000. The budget for the year to 31 December 2012 is also based on a budgeted surplus with a budgeted increase in unrestricted funds of c£70,000. Cash flow forecasts show that for the foreseeable future and on a continuing basis the charity is able to meet its liabilities and commitments to funders as they fall due.

Plans for Future Periods

BGCI plans its activities on an annual basis, as agreed by the Board. The organisation is actively working towards achieving the objectives as described in BGCI's five year plan (2007 – 2012). A continuing priority will be to widen the funding base for the work of BGCI to support an expanding portfolio of conservation and education activities around the world and to secure funding that is unrestricted in its application.

The key focus areas for 2011 will be to:

- Complete the projects on social inclusion and Seeds of Unity in the UK
- Implement a major EU-funded education project (INQUIRE). The project involves 17 partners in 11 countries and is focused on developing enquiry-based learning in botanic gardens and schools in Europe.
- Continue to support the user-service development and outreach strategy for the 4D4Life project
- Work with the CBD Secretariat on the implementation of the Global Strategy for Plant Conservation
- Develop on-line and printed versions of a GSPC toolkit
- · Publish a popular guide to the GSPC
- Publish a report on the conservation of threatened Japanese plants in UK gardens
- Continue to support threatened species recovery programmes in China, Pakistan, Colombia and Cuba.
- Continue to support red-listing of important plant species, publish the Red List of Rhododendrons and carry out a survey of ex situ collections of Rhododendrons
- Publish two issues each of BGjournal and Roots and further develop e-communications with our membership and the wider community.
- Continue to develop the plant and garden databases, especially in support of work on alien invasive species and ecological restoration
- Develop a proposal to submit to the JRS Biodiversity for the development of a centre of excellence in bioinformatics at the National Museums of Kenya
- Conduct a workshop on medicinal plant conservation in Uganda
- Work with a number of major botanic gardens on the development of an ecological restoration network and publish a manual of tree restoration.

Directors' and Trustees' responsibilities for financial statements

Notes forming part of the financial statements

1 Accounting policies

(a) Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 1993 and the Charities SORP 2005. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No. 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company.

The accounts present information about the company as an individual undertaking and not about its group on the grounds that the subsidiary company has been dormant since incorporation and therefore the trustees are not required by Section 399 of the Companies Act 2006 to prepare group accounts for the year.

(b) Going concern

The trustees have considered the financial position, forecasts and budgets as explained on page 7 of the Trustees' and Directors' Report and are satisfied that it is appropriate to prepare the accounts on a going concern basis.

(c) Depreciation

Computer equipment is depreciated at 15% to 25% per annum on a straight-line basis in order to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives.

(d) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in note 11 to the financial statements.

(e) Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations, gifts and legacies and grants that provide core financing or are of general nature are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Such income is only deferred when the donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods or the donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Notes forming part of the financial statements (continued)

(f) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the conservation and protection of plant species of the world including research, education and vocational training and the dissemination of information.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity
 cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, e.g.
 allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time
 spent and other costs by their usage.

(g) Grants

Grants are awarded to members or other conservation organisations, who have agreed a partnership in order to undertake direct, on the ground plant conservation projects that achieve the objectives of BGCI.

(h) Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the unrestricted fund as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

(i) Foreign currency

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Assets and liabilities at the year end are converted into sterling at the year end rate. Any loss or gain on foreign currency conversion is charged to overhead expenses as incurred.

(j) Volunteers and donated services and facilities

The value of services provided by volunteers is not incorporated into these financial statements, as it is not considered significant.

Where services are provided to the charity as a donation that would normally be purchased from our suppliers, this contribution is included in the financial statements at an estimate based on the value of the contribution to the charity.

(k) Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from liability to corporation tax on its charitable activities.

(I) Leasing arrangements

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the unrestricted reserves on a straight-line basis over the lease term.
